

## How To Write A Textbook Chapter

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### **Writing a textbook - Advice for authors**

Firstly, textbook writing is related to instructional design and therefore one might look at textbooks in terms of some instructional design models and methods. On a prescriptive level, one might argue that authors should use at least some

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kind of backwards design , i.e. define what students are supposed to be able to do (e.g. solve problems) and then write the books that enables them to do so.

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Phase 1: Getting started. 1. Decide what the book is about. Good writing is always about something. Write the argument of your book in a sentence, then stretch that out to ... 2. Set a daily word count goal. 3. Set a time to work on your book every day. 4. Write in the same place every time.

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Depending on the subject and the level of the textbook, writing 1-2 sentences of summary per paragraph may be the right ratio of information to note-taking. 2. Paraphrase information from the text. You should write your notes in your own words. Paraphrasing information usually shows that you genuinely understood what you read (it's difficult ...

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Determine a writing goal, including how many days a week you intend to set aside time to write, and set a deadline or due date for when you'd like to have parts of your book. Block off chunks of time to write every week. If you're looking for a place to start, consider one to two hours per day five days per week.

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
